TEXTBOOKS: <u>ELEMENTS OF LITERATURE</u>, 4TH COURSE

COURSE GOALS AND CONTENT:

In this course, students will be taught a variety of skills that will assist in developing essential skills outlined in the common core standards that focus on key ideas and details; craft and structure; integration of knowledge and ideas; and range of reading and level of text complicity. During the semester, students will review the conventions of modern English grammar and the evolution of the English language and its mechanics. Literary selections from a wide variety of authors from across the world will be used in the development of compositions and critical thinking skills. Each student will have the opportunity to express their opinions through the use of journal entries and other methods to generate class discussions and seminars periodically throughout the year. Active participation, whether individual or group, is a vital part of this course and, thus, is required of all students. Additionally, literature and/or monthly exercises provide material for vocabulary building. All skills acquired will help in preparation for student mastery assessments every two weeks and the NC EOC exam which counts as 20% of the final grade.

POWERSCHOOL: The most effective way of monitoring your progress in this course is to utilize the Powerschool website. Grades are updated weekly and it is your responsibility to make sure all work is submitted in order to receive credit. On the 4x4 schedule, a progress report or report card is issued every two weeks. Once grades are posted for the grading period, the window for making up any work missed becomes shorter.

WARMUP ACTIVITIES: After the bell rings, we will open up with a five-ten minute activity. All warmups will be collected after two-three weeks regardless of whether you were absent. It is your responsibility to make up any missing warmup assignments when you return to school.
