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Welcome to English III. I am very excited for this school year. Students are expected to master the NC standards for 11th grade reading and writing literature and informational texts. We will do this through the study of American Literature as set out by the Cumberland County Schools pacing guides.

Students will be taking the English 3 Final Exam which is 20% of the total grade. The final exam consists of four to six long (6 to 8 pages each) reading passages with 48 questions and two writing prompts. Students have 120 minutes to take the test. They will not have extended time except where required by an educational plan (for example an IEP or 504).

Constructed response items (writing prompts) on the NC Final Exam of English III will draw from the following NC Standard Course of Study standards:

- Reading for Literature.2. Determine two or more themes or central ideas of a text and analyze their development over the course of the text, including how they interact and build on one another to produce a complex account; provide an objective summary of the text.
- Reading for Informational Text.2. Determine two or more central ideas of a text and analyze their development over the course of the text, including how they interact and build on one another to provide a complex analysis; provide an objective summary of the text.
