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Course Description:

This course is aligned to the EMT certification available from the North Carolina Office of Emergency Medical Services and is part one of a two-course sequence required to meet the mandatory hours of training. The course includes skills in each area and uses resources from the community to help deliver instruction to the students. English language arts are reinforced. Work based learning strategies appropriate for this course include job shadowing. Apprenticeship and cooperative education are not possible for this course. HOSA and SkillsUSA competitive events, community service, and leadership activities provide the opportunity to apply essential standards and workplace readiness skills through authentic experiences.
